After his video interview, James shared that he thought he would never be the one to speak in front of a camera. He expressed a hope that his story may help other consumers on their road to recovery.

Holly Koehler, is a Lifesharing Consumer who has lived with the Heller family for over six years. She expressed her gratitude to FCS for thinking of individuals coming out of the hospital into the community as she, herself, was quite



unsure of what to expect. She spoke of her time in an FCS Group Home, finding her first permanent job and FCS assisting her with a job coach,

then finally moving in with her family—the Hellers. Holly explained that she is now very independent and confident. She enjoys her family, and continues to watch the Heller children (and grandchildren) grow along with her.

Cesar Coley, a group home consumer explained how he recently went from a


hospital setting, and how FCS is assisting him in becoming more independent within the com-
